## Categorical Programs - Background

- Categorical programs are a major component of district and site services.
- Federal and State categorical programs were created by the legislators to serve the special needs of students that are not covered by the general fund regular education programs.
- Each categorical program comes with its own program intent, rules, regulations, and exemplary practices.
- All categorical funds that schools receive and are allocated locally will additionally account for budgeting through the Single Plan for Student Achievement.



# Categorical Programs - Background

No Child Left Behind

- On January 8, 2002, President Bush signed into law the No Child left Behind Act (NCLB)
- Accountability for Results
- Unprecedented State & Local Flexibility & Reduced Red Tape
- Focusing Resources on Proven Educational Methods
- Expanded Choices for Parents



# No Child Left Behind – Title I

- Largest Federal Program in California aside from Special Education.
- AUSD qualifies for Title I based on the number of students who qualify for free or reduced meals.
- Students who receive services are those who show an academic need.
- Funds must be used in a variety of ways as long as they provide supplemental support.
- Title I funds at AUSD pay for:
  - Complete or partial salary of 40 different positions adding up to 16 FTE, including.
    - 1 FTE, Vice Principal at Ruby Bridges Elementary.
    - 10 FTE, Teaching Staff at Wood Middle, Ruby Bridges, Paden, Haight, & Maya Lin.
    - 4 FTE, Para Professional.
    - Counselor, Student Support Provider, Health Clerk, and Office Assistants at Title I Schools.
  - Various services including support for homeless children, tutoring through private companies and parent outreach.
- AUSD receives a total of \$1.47 million in Title I allocation.



#### No Child Left Behind – Title I

- Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) toward the goal of 100% students meeting State Standards by 2013-14 school year.
- Program Improvement (PI) is formal designation for Title I funded schools that fail to make AYP for two consecutive years.
- 229 Schools, out of 382 in Alameda County, receive Title I funding.
- 162 Schools, out of 229 Title I Schools in Alameda County, are in Program Improvement.
- AUSD has Five Title I Schools:
  - Wood Middle
    Program Improvement Year 3
  - Ruby Bridges
  - Paden

- Program Improvement Year 2 Safe Harbor (Last year in Program Improvement Year 1) Not in Program Improvement
- Haight & Maya Lin



# No Child Left Behind – Title 1

- The Board of Education may decide to withdraw from Title I and return \$1.47 million in Title I funding.
- The Board of Education has the discretion to apply for re-entry into Title I program.
- Re-entry into Title I will be at the same level where the exit was. Improvements made during the non-Title I years will not be counted.
- Education technology funds were linked to Title I. If Education technology program comes back, it may still be linked to Title I.
- Title II (Teacher Quality) funding is linked to Title I counts. As per CDE, Title II funding will continue even if AUSD decides to withdraw from Title I program.
- CDE or the US Department of Education has no written documentation on withdrawing from Title I program and consequences of any such withdrawal.



## No Child Left Behind – Title 1

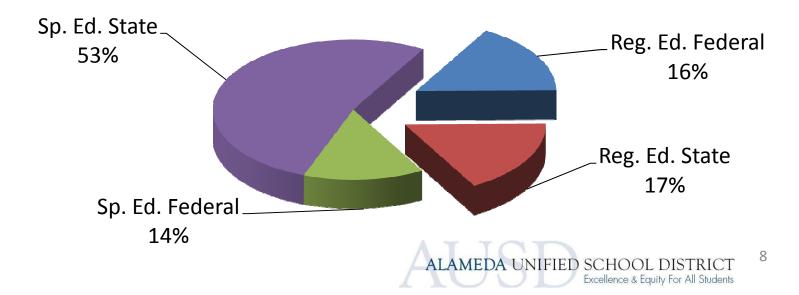
- AUSD receives \$1.47 million a year in Title I funds.
- <u>Scenario 1</u>: Refuse Title I funds and stop providing supplemental services of \$1.47 million used for 16 FTE.
- <u>Scenario 2</u>: Refuse Title I funds but continue to provide supplemental services. \$1.47 million cut will have to be made to Regular Education to carve out funds to provide supplemental services. This would entail allocation of fewer funds/personnel/services to other AUSD schools.
- <u>Scenario 3</u>: Accept Title I funds and continue to provide supplemental services to Title I Schools.

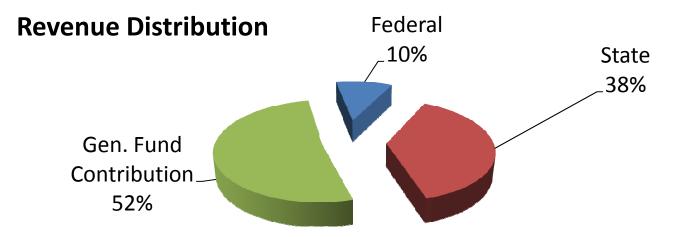
