Item Title: Update on Magnet/Innovative Program Implementation

Item Type: Information

BACKGROUND: The Master Plan adopted by the Board of Education on February 2010 provided for the establishment of “attractive school options to provide desirable choices and deepen student, family, and community engagement in the youth’s lives and education.” To meet this goal, groups of teachers and administrators were encouraged to form proposal teams in an effort to create innovative programs or magnet schools.

On May 11, 2011, proposal teams submitted their Request for Proposals (RFPs) which were then reviewed to determine if the proposals aligned with the District’s vision, mission, and guiding principles. Six written proposals were submitted to the Board for review on June 14, 2011.

On June 28, 2011, the Board voted to approve the allocation of \$63,000 of budgeted Measure A funds to provide proposal teams with the resources required for further developing proposals for Phase II submission to the Board.

On November 15, 2011, the teams working on innovative program and magnet school proposals presented on their progress in planning for their proposal submissions on December 1, 2011.

Tonight’s presentation reviews and synthesizes the progress of the proposal teams during Phase II as well as describing the work ahead in the coming months.

 - Proposals were reviewed to determine if they aligned to the District's vision, mission, and guiding principles as well as community input received from Master Plan

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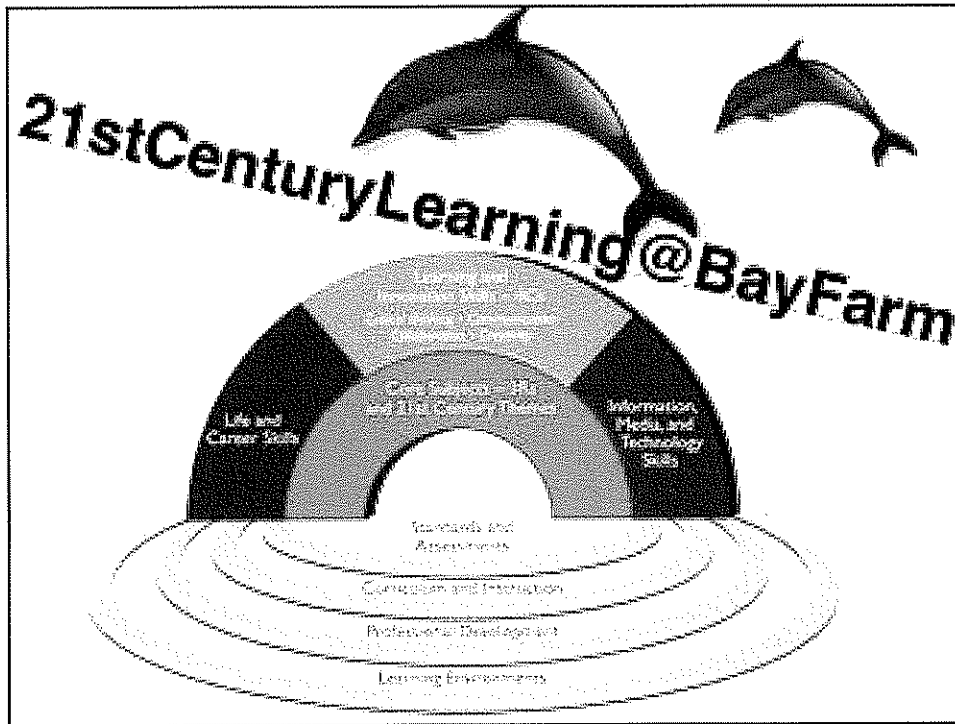

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Global Education through the Arts

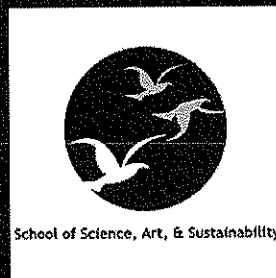
Creating smart, critical thinking kids who love art and know they can do anything.
