Sales Tax Increase

• 1.5 cents • Effective March 1, 2009 • Expire December 31, 2011 • \$2.35 billion in 2008-09 • \$7.114 billion in 2009-10



Tax Services

- Effective March 1, 2009: appliance, vehicle, & auto repair; veterinarian services
- Effective April 1, 2009: amusement parks, sporting events, golf

Oil Severance Tax

- 9.9% of the gross value of each barrel
- Effective February 1, 2009
- \$358 million in 2008-09
- \$855 million; in 2009-10



Alcohol and Excise Taxes

- 5 cents a drink
- "Drink" = 1.5 oz distilled spirits, 12 oz beer, or 5 oz wine
- \$244 million in 2008-09
- \$585 million in 1009-10



Reduce Dependent Exemption Credit

 Begin with 2008 tax year • Reduce from \$309 to \$99 (same as personal exemption)

• \$1.44 billion in 2009-10



Proposed Mid-Year Cuts

• Total General Fund = 10.6% • K-12 = 14.6%Put another way: K-12 is 40% of budget but getting 55% of the cuts

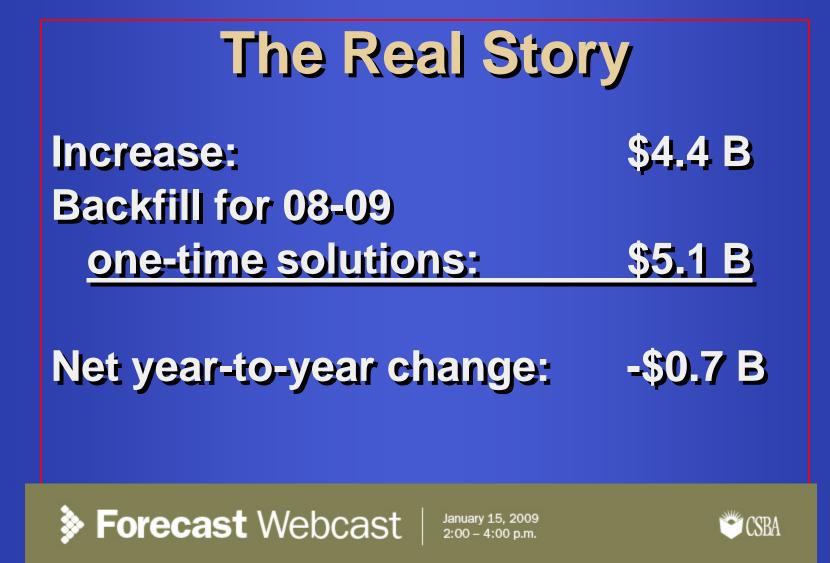


Governor shows 11.9% K-12 increase in 2009-10, <u>but</u>:

- That is from the reduced 2008-09 base
- It includes more money to backfill for loss of property taxes and lottery revenue
- Some of next year's money must pay this year's bills

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Loss of COLA plus direct cuts to the revenue limit means that revenue limit funding will be 16.2% <u>below</u> statutory levels in 2009-10.

Suspend all K-12 mandates except:
